Archaeology In Depth -Educator Professional Development and Museum Staff Training

SAS staff offer a half-day (3 hours) or full day (up to 6 hours) training session for middle and high school years teachers, or for museum staff and volunteers.

Digital presentations about Saskatchewan archaeology are followed by hands-on learning with SAS archaeology resources, such as the ArchaeoKit and ArchaeoCaravan activities.

Individual activity kits add to learning about archaeology and its many components.

Topics may include rock art, pottery making, ceramic reconstruction, bison hunting, animals of the fur trade, bison bone matching game, and more. These activities may be offered through of the ArchaeoCaravan Program as well. Materials and instructions are included with each kit.
